## 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

A continuation of the skills and perceptual growth illustrated in ART 122 with additional attention devoted to gathering and selecting information and working over an extended period of time. The major emphasis changes to painting (from drawing in ART 122).

Here you will use acrylic paint as a core medium to explore the technical and expressive possibilities of paint texture, color and surface. Historical and contemporary painting will play a large part in your course of study. Research and studio experimentation are equally important.

Painting assignment: COLOR
Cityscape: Paint an ugly corner of your city

## 1. Find a street corner, alley or empty lot, the uglier the better. You will need to draw this site on location.

Use your sketchbook or use Mayfair and borrow a drawing board from class. Use graphite and colored pencils. For this assignment photographs will not help you create a successful painting-because you will be drawing the negative space.
(The in-studio class will help you with color and negative space)
(drawing is complete for jan $27^{\text {th }}$ )
2. Prep your masonite surface for painting.

Similar to the exercises in class, draw the negative space of the street corner to construct the under-drawing. All details, like telephone lines, street signs, garbage cans, bus shelters, are to be drawn in negative space. Remember that negative space, drawn with attention and observation, will achieve unity.

3. After sketching the negative space, work with color. When you are painting a scene from life which has an over whelming variety of colors, including a multitude of hues, values, and levels of saturation, you are not obligated to "match" them all. Attempting to copy nature will seldom result in a cohesive, effective visual statement. Instead, choose colors to replicate or enhance only selected aspects of the color relationships visible in your subject matter.
