WELCOME TO GEOGRAPHY 105!

Camosun College Calendar Description:

Introduction to the physical and human geography of British Columbia. The course takes a topical approach to examine the physical, economic, resource, settlement and social geography of the province, with attention paid to the landscape, character and images of its regions.

Prerequisites: C+ in English 12 or assessment

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Distinguish between regional and topical geography.

2. Use appropriate techniques and information sources in the geographic study of British Columbia.

3. Describe the physical and human geography of British Columbia.

4. Describe and analyze, using geographic themes and approaches, topics related to the Geography of British Columbia, such as resource management and use, settlement patterns and development, and regional identities and issues.

Learning Resources:

The required textbook for the course is:

McGillivray, Brett. *British Columbia: People and Landscapes In Transition*. Vancouver: UBC Press, 2000. The textbook is available for purchase from the Camosun College Bookstore.

Website materials include notes written by the instructor for each topic in the course and are found in the "Course Contents" area of the course site.

A package of exercises and assignments for the course, available for purchase from the Camosun College Bookstore.

For students who live outside of the Victoria area, arrangements will be made for you to purchase the textbook and exercise package from the bookstore.

Learning Sequence:

This section of Geography 105 is delivered through BC Campus, using Webct. The quality, content and standard of the course is identical to a classroom section of the course at Camosun College.

To deliver this course, a combination of materials is used. They include the readings from the course textbook, contents on the course website, and audio programs.

The assigned readings from the textbook are to be treated like assigned readings in a regular classroom section. The contents written by the instructor are similar to lecture notes. They are designed to provide, clarify and enhance the essential content of the course. The audio programs offer a further source of material for the course. Each program focuses on topics related to the course. The programs are found at http://weaver.disted.camosun.bc.ca and can be heard using "Real Player". They are 30 minutes each in length.

The topic and speaker for each program is listed below in the Detailed Course Schedule.

The programs can also be heard on CKMO Radio - Village 900 - at AM900. The broadcast range is southern Vancouver Island. A program is broadcast twice during the appropriate week at 5:30pm on Monday.

Assignment # 2: 9% of the course grade

The exams will be based on the textbook readings, course contents and audio programs. Exams # 1 and 2 are scheduled during the semester. Exam # 3 is scheduled during the final exam period at Camosun. Exam # 1 will cover Approaches to Utopian Settlement inclusive; Exam # 2 will cover Mining to Fisheries inclusive; and Exam # 3 will cover Tourism to Urban Systems inclusive. More detailed information about each exam will be available closer to the exam. For students who do not live in the Victoria area, arrangements will be made for you to write the exams in your community.

There are six exercises in the course and they are worth 3 to 5% each of the course grade. They are an integral part of the course as they provide an opportunity to apply or augment the course material to the development of your knowledge and understanding of the subject matter. The exercises are in an exercise package that can be purchased through the Camosun Bookstore. The completed exercises can be either handed in at the instructor's office or emailed to the instructor by the appropriate date. Late exercises will be penalized at the rate of 10% per day and after the fifth day will not be accepted.

Assignment # 1 involves the completion of a self-guided historical field trip in downtown Victoria; whereas Assignment # 2 focuses on an examination of a resource issue in the province. Both assignments are found in the Exercise and Assignment package. Assignment #1 is due on Tuesday March 1st; and your posting in response to Assignment #2 is to be on the course site by 9:00pm on Tuesday April 5th.
