Intended Learning Outcomes

Through reading textbooks and primary source materials, hearing faculty lectures, participating in seminars, participating in field trips, researching and writing papers, making presentations, and performing tests, at the end of the course students will be able to

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the history of Aboriginal Rights and Title issues in Canada, and particularly in British Columbia.
- 2. Identify and think critically about historical sources relevant to First Nations' history.
- 3. Identify those sources that are critical to the successful preparation of the various forms of land claims.
- 4. Describe the various types of land claims.
- 5. Differentiate among the various court decisions.
- 6. Identify key elements of the *Indian Act* and its Amendments.
- 7. Demonstrate an understanding of federal and provincial legislation pertaining to First Nations history.
- 8. Research and communicate orally and in writing.

Students are expected to attend all classes, read assigned material and be prepared to discuss it in class. It is the student's responsibility to ensure assignments are turned in on or before the due date. Students are encouraged to ask questions and to meet with the instructor to discuss assignments or to seek clarification
