## 4. Course Content and Schedule

-Introduction to drawing techniques: gesture, contour, modeling, perspective,

manipulating space, composition, value, color, scale and composition

-Engaging properties of drawing tools: pencils, conte, charcoal, ink, paint, pastels, and different paper/surfaces, collage, mixed media

-Other aspects of drawing and painting: content, reference, historical/contemporary examples (includes slides, video, gallery visits, and visiting artists)

-Working with elements of drawing/painting within specific projects: expression/themes/content; comparing historical/contemporary uses of drawing processes and techniques

-Collaborative projects

-Use critique to identify and define the above elements

-Sketchbooks

**There will be 9-12 projects**: initial drawings, concealed forms, illustrations, expressive drawings, mixed media, the human figure, Zines, time based drawings, drawing muscles and machines etc.

There will be 4 all-class critiques/presentations, 1 individual mid-term review, 1 end-of-term review, as well as weekly individual assessments

## 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a)	Assignments	Assignments -70% in-class assignments: students are expected to complete all assignments given by the instructor. <u>All</u> <u>assignments</u> (this includes Reviews of art exhibitions and Reviews of visiting artists), will be evaluated while in progress and at a mid-term and end-of-term portfolio submission and reviews.
(b)	Other (eg, Attendance, Project, Group Work)	<ul> <li>Sketchbooks <ul> <li>-15% students are required to keep a sketchbook for the term, evaluated at mid-term and end-of-term review.</li> </ul> </li> <li>(c)Attendance <ul> <li>-15% students are expected to attend all classes, on time and to participate in class activities and discussions.</li> <li>You are evaluated weekly on your participation, innovation, willingness to experiment and desire to resolve your projects.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

An abundance or lack of art talent will not necessarily determine success in the course. No letter grades will be given before the final grade—unless you make a specific request to the instructor. Students are required to attend and participate in all classes and be responsible for completing all studio and take-home assignments. Students are required to keep a portfolio of their assignments and must attend an end of term portfolio interview with the instructor. Students are required to maintain a C grade or better in order to continue in the program.

Temporary Grade	Description
