2. Intended Learning Outcomes

The 2 courses FREN 212 (fall) and FREN 214 (winter), advanced training in oral and written French, may be taken in either sequence and, together, will give students a knowledge of cultural, social, institutional background of works from authors who write in French (classic, modern, or journalistic). Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Speak and write with a native-like fluency, using all moods and tenses of French verbs and avoiding anglicisms.
- 2. Express personal opinions both in writing and in speaking on a variety of subjects including literature, institutions, traditions and culture from French Canada and France as well as other parts of the French-speaking world.
- 3. Have increased and improved the richness and appropriateness of vocabulary, variety in grammatical structures, and sentence patterns.
- 4. Write different types of composition such as text commentary and summary.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will be evaluated on the basis of their participation (20%), their written weekly assignments (20%), their oral presentations to the group (20%) -some of which can be recorded and played on CKMO as agreed at the beginning of the class-. There will also be a final test (40%).

Students are encouraged to review their progress with the instructor two or three times before the end of the term. The schedule and content of the written assignments and the oral presentations will be established as a group in the first week of class, according to the number of participants and the radio time available.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
