2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Recognize the standard systematic procedures used by Americanist archaeologists to investigate the past including site survey and excavation, artifact analysis, faunal analysis, mapping.
- 2. Discuss the nature of the archaeological evidence.
- 3. Identify and discuss basic theoretical approaches in archaeology at low level, middle range and high level.
- 4. Identify and discuss reasons for conservation and protection of archaeological sites and artifacts.
- 5. Critically evaluate professional and non-professional ideas and writings about prehistory.
- 6. Carry out descriptive analyses of certain types of artifacts.
- 7. Discuss divergent ideas of the past.
- 8. Outline the attitudes and concerns of First Nations communities in regard to archaeological excavation, human skeletal remains and interpretation of North American prehistory.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a)	Assignment	 20% There is one assignment for Anth 240. For this assignment you will replicate a local artifact of your choice. In addition to the artifact, you will write a supporting paper explaining the manufacturing process and significance of the artifact. A detailed assignment description will be handed out in the second week of class. This assignment is due on March 19th. Please note: Students are expected to hand assignments in on time. For late assignments, 10% of the grade will be deducted per day, and assignments will not be accepted more than three days after the deadline.
(b)	Exams	 50% There will be two exams comprised of multiple choice questions, matching, open-ended short answer questions and long answers. Exam 1: 25% - Feb 19th Exam 2: 25% - Written during Final Exam Period (April 16th - 24th) The exams are not cumulative, although some concepts and theoretical aspects will be discussed throughout the term. It is possible that you will receive a take-home question for the final exam which will require you to reflect on concepts used throughout the term Please Note: Both exams must be written to successfully complete Anthropology 240. Exams must be written at the scheduled times. In the case of illness, a medical certificate must be presented to the instructor. There will be no exceptions without a medical certificate. Additional exams/assignments are not available to students in order to upgrade poor marks from exams or assignments.
(c)	Labs	30% Labs meet every Thursday. There are ten labs throughout the term and two lab quizzes. Each lab assignment is worth 10 marks and each lab quiz is worth 25 marks for a total of 150 marks. In other words, each lab assignment is worth 2% of your final grade and each lab quiz is worth 5% of your final grade. The labs are designed so that you can complete them in class. You must pass the lab section of this course to get a passing grade in ANTH 240.

Temporary Grade	Description
