2. Intended Learning Outcomes

The two courses French 102 and 103 will give students a good overview of the French language systems and some awareness of the Francophone world. Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Speak, write, read and comprehend written and spoken French, using basic structures and a vocabulary dealing with the subject matter studied.
- 2. Express their thoughts in the present tense, the future and the past tense (with an introduction to the conditional and subjunctive moods).
- 3. Meet basic survival needs in a French environment, and successfully communicate their intentions.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

This is the second half of a Basic Conversational French Course.

Students will be evaluated on the basis of their oral participation to class and lab (20%), their weekly assignments (15% + 5% for one oral assignment), and periodic tests (60%).

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of : Heilenman & Kaplan 's <u>Voilà</u> from chap.11 up to and including chap. 19.

Prior to tests, students are required to complete the workbook : <u>Voilà</u>, <u>Cahier d' activités</u>, after reading the grammatical explanations given in the textbook, at the pace of one chapter per week.

To complete the Lab work, students will be required to participate in formally organized activities (1 hr a week) in Y 209. The French monitor responsible of the lab time will help students to work methodically and guide them through the weekly requirements. It is essential that the students have their chapter exercises completed before attending the Friday class.

Because of the progressive and cumulative nature of the course, late assignments will not be accepted and because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing. Written assignments will be explained in class.

- (a) Assignments : 20% Weekly written assignments = 15% + 5% for one oral assignment
- (b) Tests : 60% Periodic chapter tests : 60%
- (c) Participation and attendance to class and labs : 20%

Temporary Grade	Description		
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
