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5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of <u>Ensemble : grammaire</u> from Chapter 7 up to and including Chapter 11 and the mini- review (ch.1). Students are expected to complete the exercises in the grammar book and do the necessary oral review with monitors. Dates of tests will be confirmed in class; because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing.

Written assignments are due once a week following the weekly readings in Exploration : Schunk/Waisbrot (10 minimum).

The purpose of the Lab is to give students a chance to assimilate the material between classes, to practice on a one to one basis and to identify problem areas.
