2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1) Describe the use of photographs, both historically and in contemporary times, as a medium for creative expression
- 2) Use a SLR camera to make technically sound and aesthetically-pleasing black and white photographs
- 3) Use a variety of print and negative manipulation techniques
- 4) Thoughtfully critique own and other's photographs

this is with the understanding that you know how to properly use the equipment before signing it out; that is, you have to attend the class which introduces the equipment before you are allowed to sign it out!

4. Course Content and Schedule

Overview

The first six weeks of the term is dedicated to learning photography basics. This is an *intensive* learning curve and requires your attendance at all classes and labs, that is, from 9-1 and during lab time: 2-3 pm. Once the technical component is finished, the rest of term is dedicated to perfecting your photography skills and using the medium in more creative ways. The classes after mid term will be less structured, and with the open project, you will be able to focus on one concept over a period of 3-4 weeks.

Equipment available for sign out

note: before various equipment or kits can be signed out, you must have been introduced to it in photo class first! Once you have been introduced to it, then you may sign it out. If you missed the class that went over the equipment/processes, you are not allowed access to it until given.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

shooting assignments

The shooting assignments in the first half of the term will be due on different dates. These assignments introduce students to how to use their cameras and expose film in various and challenging circumstances and how to progressively improve their technical skills (exposing film, processing negs, making prints).

Emphasis during the first six weeks of the term is on the technical aspects of photography

- -the grading for the shooting / printing assignments is weighted more on the technical aspects
- -this technical quality refers to exposure of film, film processing, and prints

Each assignment will be graded out of 5 possible marks. Specific grading criteria will be handed out with each assignment and/or will be posted in room 123.

note: Expect that **each** assignment will take around **5-7 hours from start to finish**: 1-2 hours shooting the assignment, 30 minutes processing, 30 minutes making a contact sheet, 1.5 hours to make a print; add in 1 hour contingency in case there is a problem. Budget your time accordingly; **plan** to sign out specific equipment and / or sign up for darkroom time. Some class time will be allotted for working on your assignments but more than likely you will be working on the projects outside of class. **Organization and preparation are key to assignment enjoyment and success!**

Open project

In the last 3-4 weeks of the term, there will be an extended photographic investigation worth 40% of the term grade. A combination of the various shooting assignments and based on personal (artistically driven) interest, students will select a "project" to develop. This project MUST be approved by the instructor BEFORE you begin it. The emphasis will be on **project development**, that is, how you "pushed" the original concept in order to arrive at your final body of work. Part of the project includes writing an artist statement, which will be included in the open project mark. It will be graded for its content in relation to the body of work, as well as its clarity and relevance to the art work produced.

Writing assignment -- This will be discussed in class.

Participation (10%)

The 10% allotted for class participation is based on regular class attendance (which includes arriving for class on time), a willingness to participate in group discussions and critiques, and valuable contributions to discussions. Missing more than 2 classes per term can seriously affect your final grade because there is much in-class learning and each class builds upon the skills learned in the previous class.

Visual Arts Department Late policy

In order to avoid bottlenecks in the labs, the dept. has a late policy whereby students may receive a 24 hour extension on assignments if the extension is requested ahead of time. Otherwise a grade of 0 will be issued.

6. Grading System

The following percentage conversion to letter grade will be used:

A+ = 90 - 100%	B = 73 - 76%	D = 50 - 59%
A = 85 - 89%	B- = 70 - 72%	F = 0.0 - 49%
A- = 80 - 84%	C+ = 65 - 69%	
B+ = 77 - 79%	C = 60 - 64%	

Remember: you need a C grade or higher in all Visual Arts program classes in order to stay in the program
