COMPLETION OF ASSIGNMENTS and EXAMS:

1. Examinations (60% of your final grade)

- A. Examination #1: (20% of final grade) The format will be multiple choice, fill in the blank, matching, short answer and true/false. Date: October 9th
- B. Examination #2: (20% of final grade) The format will be multiple choice, fill in the blank, matching, short answer and true/false. You will also be given a 'case study' where you will be analyzing and interpreting the criminal behaviour in question using theories introduced thus far in the course. Date: November 15th
- C. Examination #3: (20% of final grade) The format will be multiple choice, fill in the blank, matching, short answer and true/false. You will also be given a 'case study' where you will be analyzing and interpreting the criminal behaviour in question (similar to exam #2). Date: TBA during the final examination week

2. Library Skills Exercise (requirement – must be completed 2.5%)

The library assignment is conducted by the college librarian and will consist of exercises designed to familiarize you with the Camosun College Library/Media Centre. This date for this exercise is tentatively set for September 20th and will take place during class time. Attendance and completion of the assignment is mandatory. The assignment will be handed in to me September 27th. Please do not hand your assignment back to the librarian. You will receive 1% for attending the Library Orientation during the designated class time and 1.5% for completing the assignment and handing it in on time.

3. Evaluation of a Criminological Study (15% of final grade)

The specific criteria for this assignment will be distributed to you on September 25th It will be due October 4th at the start of class.

4. Evaluating Web Sources Library Exercise (requirement – must be completed 2.5%)

This exercise will be conducted by a college librarian and will consist of exercises designed to help you analyze and evaluate the information provided on web sites.
