	Assignment #2 Write your family story within the conventions of your chosen myth, fable or fairy tale. Keep in mind that most myths are written in the third person omniscient point of view. This will help you look at the story in a more objective fashion, and will also help you concentrate on plot and action, rather than reflection.
	Take one of these stories and try to figure out what myth, fairy tale, or fable it most closely resembles. Think about plot themes, archetypal characters, morality, and symbols; find correspondence between the family story and your chosen myth, fairy tale or fable.
	Workshop: Write down as many of your own family stories as possible (they may or may not involve you directly).

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
