5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a) Assignments - 40% of the course grade

(b) Exams - 60% of the course grade

There are two exams in the course. The Mid Term Exam, worth 30 % of the course grade, will be a "write-at-home" exam and will cover Cultural Geography to Cultural Regions.

The Final Exam, worth 30% of the course grade, will be written at the college during the final exam period and will cover Power and Identity to Place and Symbolic Landscape.

(For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
