2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify critical themes, events, and issues in the history of Canada up to 1867.
- 2. Describe aboriginal culture and society prior to European arrival, and subsequent Aboriginal-European relations.
- 3. Compare/Contrast relations between French and English Canadians and between them and other ethnic groups.
- 4. Analyze political challenges and changes, the practice and legacy of French and British colonial control and the transformation of those systems.
- 5. Describe the development of national consciousness.
- 6. Evaluate Canadian-American relations and foreign relations.
- 7. Summarize economic, cultural, and social development.
- 8. Reassess and challenge traditional and existing perspectives on critical events and issues of this period.
- 9. Think critically about historical issues and writing by evaluating the arguments put forward by historians, weighing the evidence they present and making judgements about the strength of their arguments.
- 10. Define history as a distinct academic discipline, understanding its unique outlook, scope and methods and what distinguishes it from other disciplines.
- 11. Use history to define and explicate the issues of today's world, establishing a context for the present and comprehending the accomplishments, failures, tensions and issues of the present era.
- 12. Demonstrate skills in research, writing and written and oral communication.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Classes will consist of lectures and seminars. The entire class will meet on Wednesdays for lecture and will divide into two sections for Monday's seminars. You will read the assigned articles and to come to class prepared to discuss them.

15% - Article Review - Select an article from those we will be covering after the mid-term. Your review is due, in class, on the date we discuss that article in class. You must attend the class on the date your review is due and you must hand in your paper during the class. If you do not attend that class or if you do not hand it in when it is due, the instructor will assign a different article for you to review.

Exams

20%- Mid-term exam – Wednesday **October 17**. The exam will consist of short answer and essay questions.

25% - Final Exam – to be held during the final exam period (same format as mid-term)

Other

15% - Seminar participation — oral presentation during seminars will be graded based on the *quality* of your <u>participation</u>. I reserve the right to give pop quizzes on the assigned seminar material. Therefore, read the articles, come prepared to discuss the author's thesis, main points and the evidence used. As a guideline, I have prepared a number of seminar questions for you to think about.****Students who miss more than three seminars will forfeit their entire seminar mark****

Temporary Grade	Description
