4. Course Content and Schedule

Classroom , 2 hrs.; estimated out-of-class, 5 hrs per week

1. Review of common faults of instrument and bow hold, stance posture and various physical factors. Remedial exercises and studies.

- Assessment of elementary studies: Appelbaum, Wohlfahrt, Kayser, Sevcik, Kinsey, Kreutzer. et al.
- 3. Intonation: pre-hearing, vocalization, hand frame, finger patterns, variable relationships, set-up of instrument, characteristics of each finger, use of open string checks
- 4. Position; progressive process, shifting techniques and common faults
- 5. Tone production: control of the 5 factors
- 6. Vibrato: definition and acoustic characteristics
- 7. Bowing strokes and styles: detache, staccato, martelle, spiccato, sautille ricochet, colle, porte, portato. Methodology of production specific exercises and applied to studies.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)
