2. Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Describe major contemporary issues in psychology and explain their historical antecedents.
2. Apply psychological theories and understanding of current psychological issues to personal experience.
3. Conduct impartial studies of psychological topics and arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Acquaints the student with major contemporary issues in psychology and considers their historical antecedents. Topics in Life Span Development, Personality, Abnormal Behaviour, Social Cognition, Social Influence, and Social Relations are considered.

Prerequisites: English 12 or assessment.

Course Organization:

Classes will be comprised of lectures and experiential work. Material from the text and selected readings related to current psychological issues and treatments will be examined. Experiential work includes discussions, activities, and student presentations. Attendance and participation are very important for learning. DOING THE ASSIGNED READING BEFORE CLASS WILL HELP IN THE UNDERSTANDING OF LECTURES AND DISCUSSIONS. ASSIGNED READING IS PERTINENT TO DOING WELL ON THE MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS, ON QUIZZES.

*Three quizzes will comprise multiple choice, true and false and short answer. Quizzes expect you to apply the terms and concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions. There will be NO MAKE UP QUIZZES. A Bonus assignment worth 3% on Chapter 15 will be provided, the last two weeks of classes. This assignment, if completed can provide an opportunity to make up missed or inaccurate work.

Experiential Assignments will be given throughout the term in order to integrate and understand course content. All written assignments require a title page including: title of topic, course name and section, instructor's name, student's name, and date. All work is psychology is to be written using APA and is to be word processed. Be sure to reference any information throughout your work, as well as including a reference page.

Late or Missed Work:

No late work will be accepted without prior negotiation. No assignments will be accepted after the last class. There are no make up quizzes. A late presentation or assignment will have a maximum grade of C+.

Note: Completing the assigned readings prior to lecture will help with the conceptual Understanding of material covered.

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Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 ^d course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
