2. Intended Learning Outcomes

1) Identify and describe key art historical eras from pre-history to c1750

- 2) Identify the leading artists, architects and patrons
- 3) Use the vocabulary specific to the discipline
- 4) Describe various art making techniques and processes used during this time frame
- 5) Describe the various social and cultural factors that influence the production consumption, and circulation of cultural objects, and how they were used and/or interpreted during their historical moment
- 6) Describe the various social & cultural factors that influence the production and use(s) of architectural spaces

3. Required Materials—Texts

The required text is *Art History* by Marilyn Stokstad et. al.—third edition. While earlier versions will be useful, I will be referring to specific images and page numbers in this edition. There are new copies available for purchase at Camosun Bookstore. As well, the third and earlier editions are on reserve at the library or in the stacks. While I will provide a style sheet for your essay, it is good to have a writer's style manual. There are copies in the library, the Learning Skills Centre, and on-line. You will be using the Chicago Style for footnoting.

4. Course Content

Welcome to the fascinating world of visual culture!

This course explores Western art and architecture beginning with prehistoric cultures and moving chronologically to c. 1750 CE. Because it is impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few areas and artists will be explored. The artistic legacies we do investigate will be considered and discussed according to their meaning(s) and function(s) in relation to the specific society and culture that produced the art. Art works will also be examined according to styles and artistic techniques.

Course requirements: mid term (25%) & final exam (30%)

Exams are based on a <u>combination</u> of lecture notes *and* material from the assigned readings. Just reading the text or attending the lectures will not be enough! There is something from every lecture on the test. While remembering details is important, you will need to make connections. This will become apparent as the course progresses. The exam format will be in two parts: definitions and/or short answer and a take-home section.

Research essay with art project option (30%)

This is an **academic** exploration of an art historical topic or a specific piece of art. Students are expected to <u>create their own essay topic</u> based on their interests in a particular piece of art or architecture. The work you choose to write on does not have to be one discussed in class, however, it must be a researchable piece of work, that is, it must have published information about it (see essay expectations).

If you cannot come up with a topic, I can make suggestions. If you would like to write on a piece from Camosun's art collection (and publish a mini version in Nexus, or public sculpture downtown, etc., come and talk with me. With either option, the essay topics **must** fall within the cultures and time periods we cover in this course (c. 1750 – present day). Topics & art projects must be **approved by me prior to** beginning your research & art making—the deadline for an approved topic is Feb. 6 (or earlier!).

There are two options for the research essay/art project

option # 1 (essay only):

-research & write an 8-10 page double-spaced **academic research** essay (250 words per page); that means, 8-10 pages of **essay text** (2000-2500 words; do not exceed 2250 words) <u>PLUS</u> the title page, <u>photocopies of images</u>, source list of images, and bibliography. The total number of pages for your essay will be 12-14+ pages.

option # 2 (essay & art project):

-research & write an 8 page paper, double spaced (2000 words of essay text <u>PLUS</u> the title page, <u>photocopies of images</u>, source list of images, and bibliography) **AND** make a substantial art piece that highlights a key concept of your paper. **Note**: the art project itself is not marked <u>but</u> it must be a well-considered project AND there is a required "show and tell" with art projects on the last day of class. On your title page, please note that you are doing option 2.

Essay expectations (a grading matrix will be made available with more details):

- * the essay must contextualize your topic within the culture which produced/influenced its making and use
- * the topic is well-researched and information comes from a VARIETY of STRONG ACADEMIC sources
- * the topic is discussed and presented in a logical, coherent, and clear manner
- * the essay must use proper format for a research paper (details will be made available)
- * source material MUST BE CITED; use **footnotes** only; Chicago style (style sheet will be made available)

Academic consequences if source material is not cited:

Not citing your sources is a form of plagiarism and therefore cannot receive a passing grade. If you are not sure about when and how to cite your sources, consult your *Style Manual*, or see the Camosun website.

The "Study Guide" (a.k.a "the notebook"); 10% total

To assist you with managing the rather large quantity of information this course covers, you will be required to keep a "notebook." This notebook consist of your definitions to the vocabulary words given at each class as well as drawing and labeling diagrams, and the occasional (small) assignment given in class. The notebook is YOUR PERSONAL, CUSTOMIZED STUDY GUIDE. It is a place to manage, simplify, and synthesize lecture notes & information from the text. The notebook is <u>separate</u> from your class notes; it may take whatever form you prefer: coil book, loose leafs in a folder, etc.

The notebook will be taken in for grading the day you write your midterm and final exam. Photocopied pages of handwritten notebooks <u>will not be accepted</u>; if it is turned in, it will receive "0" out of 5. **Note**: Should the same or <u>very</u> similar word processed notebook be handed in by 2 or more people, the total grade will be divided evenly between the number of parties.

Completion marks (5%)

There will be a series of assignments that will assist students in completing larger assignments. If the assignments are handed in on time and completed to a satisfactory level, they will earn completion marks.

Late essay and "study guide" assignments

Late assignments will be penalized. Until I hold the assignment in my hands, **5% per day** will be deducted from the final assignment grade. The weekend (Sat & Sun) counts as 1 day. Assignments may not be accepted after 1 calendar week (7 days) from due date *unless special permission is arranged beforehand*.

Missed exams & Make-up exams

If a student misses an exam due to illness or extenuating circumstances, notify me <u>immediately</u> (voice mail is acceptable). Medical (written) certification must be produced within **three** (3) week days of missed exam before alternate testing will be arranged; otherwise a grade of "0" will be issued for that exam. The make-up exam is scheduled within 3 week days of the missed exam. Please be aware that make-up exams are completely essay-based and usually consist of up to four different essays, each approximately 8-10 paragraphs in length; the essays may or may not reflect the "review" sheet handed out at the review class.
