Pre or Corequisite: English 150.

Course Description: This course offers students with strong writing ability an opportunity to explore and develop their skills and possible goals in writing major nonfiction forms, such as features, memoir, travel, personal essay, history, and social analysis.

Learning Outcomes: At the end of the course the students will have learned to

- analyse, at a beginner's level, what it means to write creative nonfiction.
- practice the writing process appropriate to creative nonfiction.
- produce essays and articles that go beyond facts and explore the world in a personal and creative way.
- write the truth in a style that is as accurate and informative as reportage, yet as personal, provocative, and dramatic as fiction.
- consider the role of the audience in the development of style and content.
- pay attention to readability and interest in the production of writing: to produce writing that is intended to be read by a general audience.
- Use effective research techniques including conducting penetrating interviews and using electronic research tools.
