## **Course Description and Intended Learning Outcomes**

Basic learning principles are applied to everyday problems. How to deal effectively with such diverse situations as bedwetting, tantrums, non-compliance, stealing and lying in children; adult problems such as obesity, smoking, incompatibility in marriage, headaches and phobias are considered. Learning is achieved through group discussion and creative role-play situations.

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Articulate basic behaviour change principles and procedures.
- 2. Apply those principles and procedures.
- 3. Describe the factors influencing effective applications.
- 4. Describe potential pitfalls of ineffective applications.
- 5. Evaluate behaviour change programs, both scientifically and practically.

## Web CT

The course materials (web-notes, focus topics, course outline and grades) are available on my website, and were developed using webct. The first time you go to the site, please follow these steps:

- > Type http://webct.camosun.bc.ca into your address bar
- A screen with a little graduate icon will appear in the left hand corner. Click on "Log in to my Web CT"
- A screen will appear that says "Web CT ID". In the box, enter your first name followed by a period, followed by your last name and the day you were born (no spaces!) For example, if I was born on the 24<sup>th</sup> I would log in as katrina.gantly24 Beside "password" enter changeme
- Click log-in. It will prompt you to immediately change your password. Complete that, then log-in.
- A small information bar will appear along the top of the screen. It will say "Psyc 164: Instructor: Katrina Gantly". Click on the Psyc 164. This will take you to my homepage.

\*\*\*After this, it is much simpler. You'll login using your name/birthdate and new password, it will immediately take you to the web-page.

\*\*\*During the first two weeks of classes, students are often adding or dropping classes. In order to access WebCT, you must be registered in the course; therefore, if you are currently on the waitlist, it will take a few days to add you into the system. I will bring hardcopies of any documents

to class for you during these first two weeks. If you experience any difficulties logging into WebCT, please let me know right away and I'll help you in any way I can.

#### **Evaluation Methods:**

- 1. Tests: There will be four of these in total, covering approximately 5-7 chapters each. They will not be cumulative. These tests will count for 12.5% each for a total of 50% from tests. Format for these tests will be a variation of 1/3 marks from multiple choice, true/false, matching, etc., 1/3 marks from short answers (1-3 sentences long) and 1/3 marks from paragraph answers (5-7 sentences long).
- Seminar Assignments: There will be 6 of these in total asking you to apply behavioural concepts to a case study (presented and completed in class). They count for 5% each toward your final grade for a total of 30% from assignments.
- **3. Research Paper:** I will give you a separate detailed hand-out concerning the project and paper during the first seminar class. It will be worth 20% of your grade.
