Course Description:

This course focuses on psychological models of the cause and treatment of abnormal and criminal behaviours. We examine specific disorders such as antisocial personality disorder and serial murder, as well as general factors related to criminal behaviour such as alcohol abuse. Basic computer literacy, COMP 156 or equivalent recommended.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course the student will be able to describe, explain and evaluate:

- 1. Several psychological theories as they apply to the etiology and remediation of various crimes.
- 2. The relationship between psychological models of explanation and criminal and deviant behaviour in general.
- 3. Developmental risk factors as they apply to criminal and deviant behaviour.
- 4. Developmental theories of delinquency.
- 5. Biological factors for the etiology of criminal and deviant behaviour.
- 6. Learning theories as applied to various criminal and deviant behaviours.
- 7. Psychological models of the cause of violent behaviour.
- 8. Current research into the cause and treatment of criminal psychopathy.
- 9. The relationship between mental disorders, crime and the criminal justice system especially with regard to the Canadian Mental Health Act and Section 16 of the Criminal Code of Canada.
- 10. Psychological models applied to the etiology and treatment of violent crime, murder, terrorism, sexual assault, property and corporate crime, and economic crime.
- 11. The relationship between various psychoactive drugs and crime with an emphasis on alcohols unique role in the cause of a variety of crimes.
- 12. The prevention and treatment of Juvenile crime.
- 13. Correctional Psychology

2. Web CT

The course materials (web-notes, focus topics, course outline and grades) are available through webct. The first time you go to the site, please follow these steps:

- > Type http://webct.camosun.bc.ca into your address bar
- A screen with a little graduate icon will appear in the left hand corner. Click on "Log in to my Web CT"
- A screen will appear that says "Web CT ID". In the box, enter your first.last name and the day of my birthday. For example, if I was born on the 9th of June then I would type denise.iacobucci09(all lowercase).

3. Reserve Readings: There are many items <u>on reserve in the library for students</u>. These items are meant to support lecture material and provide resources for students when working on their assignments.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Course Content and Schedule

This course reviews <u>biological</u>, <u>psychological</u> and <u>social</u> explanations of criminal and deviant behaviour. Current and projected treatment approaches will also be considered along with related topics such as criminal profiling. The course will also look at the psychological effects of crime on victims and the various ways that psychology contributes to the Canadian criminal justice system.

1. There is one 2-hour lecture each week.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Evaluation for Psych 252 will consist of three tests (60%), one research review paper (20%), one team presentation (15%) and a variety of seminar activities (5%).

1. Tests (60%): There will be three tests in total covering each unit of the course which includes the textbook, assigned readings, and lecture notes. These tests will not be cumulative and will be comprised of multiple choice and short answer questions. These tests will count for 20% each for a total of 60% of your final grade.

- 2. Research Review Paper (APA) (20%): A research review paper is one that gathers the most recent relevant information about a topic, organizes it and presents a summary of findings. A typical topic would be the current state of theories or models of the cause of psychopathy. This paper can be between five and six pages long, about 1250/1500 words (5/6x250) exclusive of the title page and reference list. It needs to include "several" sources (10 is about the average), mostly primary sources. The reference list should contain only sources actually used for the paper. See the Research Paper Guidelines in the WebCT materials and seminar handout.
- 3. Team Seminar Presentations (15%): You will be selecting a team and developing a short presentation (25 to 30 minutes) and brochure (fact sheet) on a topic of your choice. A detailed outline of the expectations for the presentation will be circulated during the first two weeks of seminar. Time will be provided to you during your seminar to work on this presentation. All teams will submit a detailed outline of planned presentation one week prior to their presentation date. Following your team's presentation, each team member will evaluate one another and submit this evaluation to the instructor. These evaluations will factor into the instructor's evaluation of each team member.
- 4. Seminar Activities (5%): These include 5-point quizzes, evaluations, and reflection questions done in seminars. Students need to be present in seminar to receive credit for seminar activities. Make-up activities will only be provided when proper paperwork is submitted for seminar absence.

In general all work and assignments must be handed in on the due date. My preference, for papers, is that you email them to me from within the WebCT system or to <u>lacobucciD@camosun.ab.ca</u>. This way I have a permanent record of the paper. If an emergency or serious problem comes up prior to the exam or due date you may apply for an extension. This must be done in person before, preferably well before, the date in question. Work occasionally goes missing at an institution so you are responsible for

keeping a copy of all work handed in. A good way to avoid lost work is to hand your work in as an e-mail attachment. I will show you how to do this in the WebCT e-mail system. All written work must be in APA format.
