- 1. Explain the concepts and methods of scientific archaeology used in the writing of prehistory.
- 2. Explain the colonization of the Circum-Pacific region.

#### 5. Basis of Student Assessment

#### Exams : 100%

There will be three exams comprised of multiple choice questions, short answer questions, and longer answer questions. The exams are NOT cumulative.

Midterm exam 1	(30 or 35%)	Wednesday, October 12
Midterm exam 2	(30 or 35%)	Monday, November 14
Final Exam (35%)	written	during the College exam period

There is a take-home essay component to each exam. This provides an opportunity to use the textbook and lecture notes to answer a more complex question in more detail. A choice of two questions will be handed out in the class before the midterm, and the essay is to be handed in at the beginning of the exam. The midterms will be weighted to the benefit of the student. The exam with the highest mark will be worth 35%, and the other exam will be worth 30%.

All exams must be written to successfully complete Anthropology 140. Exams must be written at the scheduled times. In the case of illness, a medical certificate must be presented to the instructor, and the instructor must be notified BEFORE the scheduled exam time via phone message or email. If a make-up exam is scheduled because of illness, students must write the make-up exam at the mutually agreed upon time.

Please note: extra assignments are not available to students to up-grade poor marks from exams.

## **Temporary Grades**

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 <sup>rd</sup> course attempt or at the point of course completion.)	
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
