5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a) Assignments (Sec 01)

Labs (20%): A total of 5 labs will be assigned and the best 4 labs are to be counted. See schedule below or details of assignment and due days.

Term Paper (30%): Students are required to conduct research on the contemporary development issues facing one or more the Asia-Pacific region. All paper topics have to be approved by the instructor. The completed paper, with no more than 2,000 words, should be typewritten and submitted by Dec 1. Late papers will not be accepted unless prior **approval** by the instructor is obtained. Marks for late papers are to be deducted by two percent per day.

Oral Presentation (10%): Each student is expected to give a 10-15 minutes summary of his/her term paper. Schedule will be assigned by instructor.

Labs (20%): A total of 5 labs will be assigned and the best 4 labs are to be counted. See schedule below or details of assignment and due days.

Term Paper (30%): Students are required to conduct research on the contemporary development issues facing one or more the Asia-Pacific region. All paper topics have to be approved by the instructor. The completed paper, with no more than 2,000 words, should be typewritten and submitted by Dec 1. Late papers will not be accepted unless prior **approval** by the instructor is obtained. Marks for late papers are to be deducted by two percent per day.

Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
