2. Intended Learning Outcomes

1) Describe the key art movements and artists in the growth of Modern art beginning $c.\ 1750$

2) Describe the techniques, processes, and theories of Modern art making

3) Discuss the relationship between art and social change

3. Required Materials—Texts

The required text is: **Modern Art History** by Arnason (fifth edition)—there are new copies available at Camosun Bookstore; the fifth (and fourth edition) are on reserve at the library. While I will provide a style sheet for your essay (Chicago Manual of Style—using footnotes), it is good to have a writer's style manual. There will be information on reserve at Camosun library in lieu of a course pack; look for the lecture overheads, essay writing tips, etc.

4. Course Content

Welcome to the *fascinating* world of visual culture! This course explores Western art and architecture beginning

c. 1750 and moving chronologically to contemporary art and architecture in the 1990s. As it is clearly impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few areas and artists will be explored. The artistic movements we do investigate will be considered in relation to their meanings, functions, and uses for their specific historical moment and culture as well as their connection to the development of modern and post-modern art. Art works will also be examined according to styles and artistic techniques. **Note:** this is a university-transfer class (UT class). As such, this class is taught at this level; exams & research papers are marked according to a 100 level UT.

Course requirements: mid term & final exam

Exams are based on a <u>combination</u> of lecture notes <u>and</u> material from the assigned readings. Just reading the text or attending the lectures will not be enough! There is something from every lecture on the test. While remembering details is important, you will need to make connections between the lectures. This will become apparent as the course progresses. The exam format: definitions and in-class essay(s). I provide the essay topics ahead of time and you will be allowed to bring in some written information for the essay.

(Possible) course requirements outside of class time:

- self-directed walking tour of public sculpture in Victoria (closer to the end of term) —mandatory
- attending the talks given by the visiting artists (schedule to follow) —recommended
- attendance at *Visual Impetus* (and other art history conferences) at UVic—recommended
- visit to AGGV (Art Gallery of Greater Victoria) or Open Space—
 recommended

Research project

The research project involves an **academic** exploration of an art historical topic, or a specific piece of 2-D or 3-D art or a piece of architecture. You will need to use Camosun's library AND the library at UVic. You may want to pay for a library card at UVic so that you can take out books instead of going through interlibrary loan. Your essay is to be 2500 words of essay text (plus or minus 250 words). See essay guidelines on reserve in the library.

DEADLINE FOR HANDING IN YOU RESEARCH PAPERS

- MAR 5 Hand in a <u>complete</u> essay (title page, completed essay with footnotes, biblio, images) and I will read the paper over, provide feedback on ways to improve it, and you can have it back to rework & hand in for grading before or on Apr 02 deadline.
- MAR 24 Hand in your paper and I will grade it with a grading sheet as well as general (written) comments.
- APR 02 Last possible day to hand in your paper; only a grading sheet will be used (no written comments).

Academic consequences regarding plagiarism

If your work is plagiarized, the assignment cannot receive a passing grade. Please be aware that plagiarism can be put through official channels at the College and can include having the incident recorded on your record to alert future instructors.
