5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Each course takes countless hours of development by our Research and Development team of the Crim Justice Department. Consultation with thousands of former students allows me to decide just how students in each term should be graded. Once we have received back the questionnaires that we mail to thousands of students, the results are tabulated and the final scores kept by Price Waterhouse. Based on this I then test-run assignments on student laboratory mice to see how the assignments work and if they are fair. This is not easy task. Finding mice that work the way students do, is tougher than it looks. And trying to differentiate between a student mouse and an adult worker mouse is a monumental task. The bottom line, therefore, is just to make sure that I, and the Research and Development mice, am happy.

Tests – There will be three tests. They will be true/false, multiple choice, and short answer. The tests will be on the following dates:

First Test – February 10 Second Test – March 10 Third Test – last day of class (April 7th)

Each exam must be written. If you miss an exam, you can not pass the course. We have a number of laboratory mice that missed one, and we had to draw the line and execute them. And that's not a pretty sight.

Spilling Texts – and you thought this wasn't high school

Due to years of disgust at the way students spell I have decided to do something professors should have done years ago. Yup, you're gonna get five little spelling tests – one every few weeks. Each is worth 2% of your course grade.

At the beginning of term you will get a list of the words to be used. You just have to find the correct spelling for them.

Case Report – talk about fun! You thought spelling tests were going to rock... now you have to partner up with someone you don't even like and make a case presentation. Here's how this works: you and your partner have to find a case that covers one of the defences or primary issues we discuss in class. It has to be a case that is not in the case book or text book or that anyone else has found. Then you present your case to the class. You must sign up for a day to present your case. Word of warning: do not leave this until the last month of class.

Each case presented will be marked as follows:

Case picked – 15 (effort, type of case, relevancy)

Presentation – 5 (effort, uniqueness)

Mock Trial - bonus marks attributed for participation

One of the highlights of the term (other than the scintillating lectures and spelling tests) is the mock trial. This takes place at the courthouse downtown and will as accurately as possible resemble a real murder trial. Students will be the judge, lawyers, witnesses, jurors, and the accused. Given the class size this year, the class will be divided into two teams: Crown and defence. Nothing like a little in-class competition to create enemies amongst friends...

Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
cw	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
