2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1) Describe the key art movements and artists in the growth of Modern art beginning c. 1750
- 2) Describe the techniques, processes, and theories of Modern art making
- 3) Discuss the relationship between art and social change

<u>3a) Required Materials—Texts</u>

The required text is: *Modern Art History* by Arnason (sixth edition)—there are new copies available at Camosun Bookstore; the sixth, fifth and fourth edition are on reserve at the library. While I will provide a style sheet for your essay (Chicago Manual of Style—using footnotes), it is good to have a writer's style manual. There will be information on reserve at Camosun library in the "Art 180 binder."

3b) Required Materials—AGGV student pass (\$10 - \$20)

To take advantage of the exhibitions and talks at the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria, everyone is required to purchase a student's pass. You can purchase this at the AGGV at your first visit. Tell them you are on "the Art 180 list." See the lecture schedule for required exhibitions/talks to attend.

4. Course Content

Welcome to the *fascinating* field of visual culture! This course explores Western art and architecture beginning c. 1750 and moving chronologically to contemporary art and architecture in the 1990s. As it is clearly impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few areas and artists will be explored. The artistic movements we do investigate will be considered in relation to their meanings, functions, and uses for their specific historical moment and culture as well as their connection to the development of modern and post-modern art. Art works will also be examined according to styles and artistic techniques.

Note: this is a university-transfer class (UT class). As such, this class is taught at this level; exams & research papers are marked according to a 100 level UT.

The "Study Guide" (5% total)

To assist with managing the rather large quantity of information this course covers, you will be required to create a "study guide." It will consist of your definitions to the vocabulary words given at each class as well as various assignments given in class—including the AGGV lecture that you are to attend. Think of it as YOUR PERSONAL, CUSTOMIZED STUDY GUIDE. It is a place to manage, simplify, and synthesize lecture notes and information. It is <u>separate</u> from your class notes; while it can take whatever form you like, use a binder-type system so that you can add pages. The Study Guide will be taken in for grading **after** your write your midterm and final exam. Photocopied pages of handwritten guides <u>will not be accepted</u>.

Course requirements: mid term & final exam

Exams are based on a <u>combination</u> of lecture notes *and* material from the assigned readings. Just reading the text or attending the lectures will not be enough! There is something from every lecture on the test. While remembering details is important, you will need to make connections between the lectures. This will become apparent as the course progresses. The exam format: definitions and in-class essay(s). I provide the essay topics ahead of time and you will be allowed to bring in some written information for the essay.

Research project

The research project involves an **academic** exploration of an art historical topic, or a specific piece of 2-D or 3-D art or a piece of architecture. You will need to use Camosun's library <u>AND</u> the library at UVic. You may want to pay for a library card at UVic so that you can take out books instead of going through interlibrary loan. Your essay is to be 2500 words of essay text (plus or minus 250 words). See essay guidelines on reserve in the library.
