5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Presentation (20%) - Schedule to be announced

Working cooperatively in pairs or threesomes, each student group will develop and deliver a presentation based on the secondary readings listed above. The group will be expected to summarize the readings assigned giving a critique of the content/methods of the research and facilitate a discussion with the class. **Each student will individually** be responsible for handing in a two-page typed summary of the presentation. Both written summary and presentation will be evaluated.

Mid-Term Exam - October 27th (20%)

The first exam will be held October 25th in the first half of the class. The exam will be based on the first six weeks of the course. The examination will consist of short question/answers and one essay question.

Book Report - October 13th (15%)

Each student is responsible for reading *Not Just A Pretty Face the Ugly Side of the Beauty Industry* by Stacy Malkan and preparing a 2-3 page book report. The report will be a general summary of the book offering a critique as to the merits of the research and arguments presented. Class on October 13th will be a discussion format with each student coming to class prepared to discuss the book.

Term Paper - due November 22nd (25%)

Each student is responsible for completing a six-page typewritten research paper that addresses one of the topics discussed in class. The student may take a broad look at a particular issue with respect to women's position in Canada or may take a more specific topic that addresses a case study of patriarchy. A list of suggested topics will be handed out inclass at the beginning of the second week of term.

Alternative, students may choose to write a chapter for the latest edition of *Turbo Chicks*. Such a paper may take any form and does not have to follow strict academic rules. For example the latest chapter may take the form of a journal entry, a newspaper article, a play, a poem, an autobiography as long as the paper fits the general layout of a typical chapter in *Turbo Chicks*. The major question answered in this paper is why the author is a feminist.

Final Exam – December 6th (in class) (20%)

The second exam will be held in class on December 6th (final class). This exam will be based on all materials discussed in the course, with a particular emphasis on materials presented after the Mid-Term. The exam will consist of short question/answers and one essay question.
