2. Intended Learning Outcomes

(No changes are to be made to these Intended Learning Outcomes as approved by the Education Council of Camosun College.)

Upon completion of this course:

1. In reading literature, students will be encouraged to make connections, consider meaning, make and support inferences, and evaluate. Instructors will select course materials and provide information to enable students to:
 - Analyze literature in the genres of poetry, fiction, non-fiction, and drama from different periods.
 - Analyze literature by men and women from various cultural backgrounds.
 - Identify literary forms, elements, and techniques.
2. In discussing literature, students will be given the opportunity to develop and communicate responses and interpretations using varied methods and resources. Students will be expected to:
 - Distinguish between literal and figurative meaning.
 - Use literary terms such as metaphor, irony, character, setting, and plot.
 - Use vocabulary associated with analyzing fiction, poetry, drama, and non-fiction.
 - Analyze themes.
 - Identify a variety of literary theories.
 - Develop an informed critical response.
3. In writing about literature, students will be expected to explain, support, and illustrate points in essays by:
 - Using a critical approach with appropriate language.
 - Comparing pieces of literature in English.
 - Documenting sources using current MLA bibliographic conventions.

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Notes on the syllabus:

1. Since every group of writers and readers is unique, the syllabus is **bound** to change.
2. If you cannot make it to class, the work and assignments you miss are **YOUR** responsibility. In other words, do not ask me **WHAT** you missed, but by all means ask me questions **ABOUT** what you missed.
3. If you cannot hand in an assignment on time, and you still want me to accept it, you **must**: (a) have a reasonable excuse, (b) let me know in person or by telephone **before** the assignment is due, and (c) plan a **date** for when you will submit your work. Late assignments will not receive any feedback other than a grade.
4. If you attempt to submit work which is not your own (whether this be someone else's words or ideas), be aware that this is a serious academic offence. A form of fraud, plagiarism is punishable at Camosun by a failing grade in that assignment at the very least, and it can seriously affect your credibility as a student and researcher. Giving credit to the original writer/thinker is both ethical and easy (use a system of bibliographic reference).

Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.

IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. <i>(For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)</i>
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
