5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

FREN 114 is a comprehensive program of in-class oral activities demanding a serious commitment and participation on the part of the student as it is based on out-of-class readings, written preparations and lab drills. It includes group presentations, role-playing, communications with individuals and small groups. Students take an active part in the implementation of the course.

Students will be evaluated on the basis of their class participation (30%), their preparation for class discussions and other activities (30%), and their oral presentations to the class as a whole (40% - 5% of which is a group mark based on the topics chosen for the oral presentations-). There will also be a mandatory individual oral test on the last day of class.

Students are encouraged to review their progress with the instructor two or three times before the end of the term.

Preparation for discussions and other activities

Students are expected to do the necessary reading and lab work associated with Explorations: Schunk/Waisbrot prior to class (see schedule p 2), as well as any preparation agreed to in class. They are, of course, expected to be ready to make oral presentations as scheduled. (objective-subjective evaluation)

Class Participation

Participation is an objective-subjective evaluation of the quantity and quality of involvement which the student brought to small groups and to the class as a whole. It is marked after each class and averaged over the 22 best marks of the semester.

Oral Presentations

Students must always be ready to give a 5-minute presentation on Mondays with prior home and Lab preparation, and will be asked to give 2-minute presentations without prior preparation.

Oral presentations will be graded in terms of pronunciation, organization of material, vocabulary (level and semantics), syntax (word order), and morphology (necessary conjugations of tenses, masculine/feminine, singular/plural). There usually are 4 "formal" presentations with lab prep. and 4 "spontaneous" presentations.

Students will get help from monitors in the Lab to organize material and rehearse their presentation. They must present one of their 5mn topics on a video cassette recorded with the Lab equipment and staff.
