2. Intended Learning Outcomes

1. Master the basic elements of grammar.
2. Increase vocabulary to 86 Kanji and 600 words.
3. Be able to engage in simple conversation.
4. Read and write short sentences.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Assignments

There are four assignments in total. Assignments will be due after completing each chapter of the textbook. Each assignment is worth 1.0 point. An assignment submitted after the deadline or done improperly, will lose up to 0.5 point.

Oral Performance

On the last day of each Chapter students (2-3 in one group) are asked to write, memorize and perform a short skit (minimum 5 sentences for each person) to cover the Chapter. Up to 1.0 point for each performance.

Quizzes

A quiz (written and listening comprehension) will be given after completing each Chapter (four in total)

Oral Examination/Presentation

There are two parts. One is to make a 3-minute speech (20 sentences) and answer some questions based on what he/she presents. The other is to answer 10 questions out of the 100 sample questions to be covered during the lab hours.

Mid-term/Final Examinations

The mid-term will be given during the regular class hour. The final exam will take place during the examination week.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
