2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1) Describe the key art movements and artists in the growth of Modern art beginning c. 1750
- 2) Describe the techniques, processes, and theories of Modern art making
- 3) Discuss the relationship between art and social change

3a.Required Materials—Text

The required text is: *Modern Art History* by Arnason (sixth edition)—there are new copies available at Camosun Bookstore; there are 2 copies on reserve in the library (2 hour loan). While I will provide a style sheet for your essay (Chicago Manual of Style—footnoting), it is good to have a writer's style manual.

3b.Required Materials—AGGV student pass (about \$10)

4. Course Content

Welcome to the *fascinating* world of visual culture! This course explores Western art and architecture beginning c. 1750 and moving chronologically to contemporary art and architecture in the 1990s. As it is clearly impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few areas and artists will be explored. The artistic legacies we do investigate will be considered and discussed according to their meaning(s) and function(s) in relation to the specific society and/or culture that produced the art. Art works will also be examined according to styles and artistic techniques.

5a. Course requirements: "celebrations of knowledge" mid term & final exam

Exams are based on a <u>combination</u> of lecture notes *and* material from the assigned readings. Just reading the text or attending the lectures will not be enough! There is something from every lecture on the test. While remembering details is important, you will need to make connections between the lectures. This will become apparent as the course progresses. The exam format: definitions, short answers, and in-class essay(s). I provide the essay topics ahead of time and you will be allowed to bring in some written information for the essay.

5b. Course requirements outside of class time

- attending talks given by Visual Art Dept's visiting artists (schedule to follow); talks are free
- self-directed walking tour of public sculpture in Victoria (will be posted on PBworks)
- visit to AGGV (Art Gallery of Greater Victoria)

5c. Research project

The research project involves an **academic** exploration of an art historical topic, or a specific piece of 2-D art or architecture or sculpture. You will need to conduct research using academic sources and create an academic essay. Your essay topics **must** fall within the cultures and time periods we cover in this course (Western art c. 1750 – present day). I will supply a list of essay topics. You will have a customized library session for this assignment.

You may submit a full first draft of your essay to me for a "pre-read"; I analyze your essay for content and structure, make suggestions for improvement, then hand it back to you so you can keep

Academic consequences if source material is not cited:

Not citing your sources is a form of plagiarism and, therefore, cannot receive a passing grade. If you are not sure about when and how to cite your sources, consult your *Style Manual*. 5d. The "Study Guide"

To assist with managing the rather large quantity of information this course covers, you will be required to create a "study guide." It will consist of your definitions to the vocabulary words given at each class as well as drawing and labeling diagrams, and assignments given in class. Think of it as YOUR PERSONAL, CUSTOMIZED STUDY GUIDE. It is a place to manage, simplify, and synthesize lecture notes and information. It is <u>separate</u> from your class notes. While it can take whatever form you like, use a binder-type system so that you can add in pages.

The Study Guide will be taken in for grading **after** your write your final exam. Photocopied pages of handwritten study guides <u>will not be accepted</u>.

Late essay and "study guides"

Late assignments will be penalized. Until I hold the assignment in my hands, **5% per day** will be deducted from the final assignment grade. The weekend (Sat & Sun) counts as 1 day. Assignments may not be accepted after 1 calendar week (7 days) from due date *unless special permission is arranged <u>beforehand</u>.*

Missed exams & make-up exams

If a student misses an exam due to illness or extenuating circumstances, notify me <u>immediately</u> (voice mail is acceptable). Medical (written) certification must be produced within **three** (3) week days of missed exam before alternate testing will be arranged; otherwise a grade of "0" will be issued for that exam. The make-up exam is scheduled within 3 week days of the missed exam and is different from the one given in class.
