5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

a. First Examination- 20%

The first exam will be held in class on **October 7th**. It will consist of Fill-In-the-Blanks, Short Answers, and Essay Questions. A review and exam preparation session will be held in class on October 5th. The exam will cover material from lectures and required readings. This first examination will serve as a preview of the other examinations in this course and of the level of performance expected in the course.

b. Second Examination- 20%

A second examination will be given in class on **November 4th**. The format will be very similar to the first exam. The exam will be based on material covered since the first exam and will include material from lectures and required readings. A review and exam preparation session will be held in class on November 2nd.

c. Media Assignment- 30%

This assignment consists of collecting and annotating five articles from newspapers which show the relationship of criminal justice to parliamentary government and then writing a comparative conclusion. A separate handout will be provided for this assignment. The media assignment is due **November 18th**. Late assignments will be penalized. No assignments will be accepted after December 2nd.

d. Final Examination- 30%

A final examination will be given during Final Examination Week, **December 13th- 21st**. The format will be the similar to the previous examinations, though the final exam will be longer. The exam will cover material presented in the course as a whole, though there will be extra emphasis on material presented since the second exam. A review and exam preparation session will be held in the last class on December 9th.

Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the $3^{'d}$ course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
cw	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
