# 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Grades are based on two exams (65%) and three assignments (35%). You will get a study guide for both exams and a handout with detailed information about the assignments.

#### Midterm Exam (30%):

The midterm will be based on all materials covered to that date, including lectures, films, and readings. It will consist of a mix of multiple-choice, short-answer, and short essay questions.

#### Final Exam (35%):

The final exam will be based on all material covered after the midterm, including lectures, films, and readings. The final exam will also include a few general concepts discussed throughout the term. The format will be similar to that of the midterm.

#### Assignment 1: Commentary on Nisa (10%)

Assignment 1 is an in-class essay on Feb. 17 that asks you to provide a summary and critical commentary on women's roles in traditional !Kung society, based on Shostak's *Nisa: The Life and Words of a !Kung Woman.* The assignment handout will give you the exact questions to address. Your paper should be between 750 and 1000 words.

# Assignment 2: Gender & Child Rearing (15%)

The basis for this assignment are Friedl's book chapters 13 and 19 in the course pack which deal with child rearing. You are asked to compare Friedl's description to specific experiences and observations from your own culture. Assignment 2 should be about five pages (1250 words). Details will follow in the assignment handout.

#### Assignment 3: Women and Development (10%)

Economic development often affects women and men differently. Assignment 3 is a short research paper in which you are asked to find two or three sources on a specific case of economic development and compare it to Lockwood's analysis of development in Tahiti (in the course pack). This paper will be about four pages (1000 words). Details will follow in the assignment handout.

**Formatting of Assignments:** All assignments have to be typed, Font 12, double-spaced, with 1-1.5 inch margins. You do not need to provide a separate title page, but the first page has to clearly show your name, the name and number of the class, the title of the assignment, and the date.

**IMPORTANT:** Both exams must be written to successfully complete this course and both must be written at the scheduled times. In the case of an emergency or grave illness, you have to inform the instructor *before* the start of the exam and present a medical certificate. There are no exceptions without such a document.

Assignments are due *in class* on the days listed in the course schedule. For late assignments, 5% of the grade will be deducted per school day, and assignments will *not* be accepted more than three school days after the deadline. You know about assignment deadlines far in advance, so plan ahead.

Also note that there is no option to redo assignments in this class, but I encourage you to see me during office hours and get feedback as you are preparing your assignments.

**Class Participation:** Group and class discussions are an integral part of this course. Up to 2% of *bonus marks* will be given to students who contribute to discussions regularly and with good comments.
