5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) Term Paper – 25%

A research essay on one of the assigned topics must be completed. Requirements for the term paper will be specified on a separate handout. The sheet will provide further information on the research essay along with the list of topics. The topic of the research paper must be taken from the list provided otherwise the paper will not be accepted by the instructor. You may not submit the same paper for two different classes at Camosun. Joint papers for two classes are acceptable only with prior approval of both instructors. Work submitted must be your own. Plagiarism may result in a zero for the assignment. The Paper is due March 24th, 2011)

- (b) Book Report – 20%

The student may choose to do a book report rather than a term paper which would focus on *Musui's Story The Autobiography of a Tokugawa Samurai* by Katsu Kokichi, translated by Teruko Craig. The book report must not only offer a brief synopsis of the story but critique the author's work, correlating the main themes of the book with course materials. The book report should be 3-4 typed pages in length. (Book Report due February 17th, 2011)
