5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Test One: The first test will be held at February 2nd and will consist of map work and short answer questions. The test will focus on material covered since the start of the course. This test will form 15% of your total grade.

Mid-Term: The mid-term will be held March 2nd and will consist of short answer questions and one essay question. The test will focus on material covered since the first test. This assignment will be worth 20% of your total grade.

Final Exam: During the last class a final exam will be set. This will make up 20% of the course grade and will consist of short answer questions and one essay style question.

Panel Discussion: In the second half of the term, students will be put into groups and assigned a country and reading to be discussed in class. Each panel will be expected to give an analysis of the information presented in the reading and offering an update of the most recent developments. The panel's presentation will be submitted to the instructor on the day of presenting. The presentation/discussion/written narrative will constitute 15% of your grade.

Research Paper: Each student is expected to research and write a 6-8 page term paper. The topic for the paper must be taken from the list provided by the instructor. No exceptions will be made. A comprehensive outline for the research paper will be discussed in class (see course schedule). It forms 30% of your total grade.

Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (<i>For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)</i>
cw	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
