4. Course Content and Schedule

Welcome to the course. This course sets out to deepen your understanding of film through an examination of the aesthetic, technical and cultural roots of cinema. We will explore the beginnings of cinema and its relation to personal experience and social issues, feminist concerns, gendered spaces and the environment.

Schedule and content

I have designed this course for students who are interested in visual art and culture and fascinated by film. This course is designed to help you understand methods and practices in filmmaking and to interpret images. In addition, the course should provide you with the ability to integrate the basic understandings and ideas about film and visual media and use them in your related scholarship and in your own life. In addition to traditional lectures, you will have the opportunity to participate in classroom discussions and group presentations and to write papers on selected films.

Schedule: class Hours Art 190, 10:30-2:30, Fridays, Fisher 100

- Introduction to film as an art form (1895-present)
- Styles and technical aspects (editing, camera movement, costumes and lighting)
- Film is considered historically, socially and artistically
- Relationship of film to major art movements (German Expressionism, Russian Constructivism, Surrealism, Abstract Expressionism, Conceptual art and Postmodernism)

Temporary Grade	Description
