#### 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of <u>Ensemble : Grammaire</u> up to and including Chapter 6. Because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing ; the dates of tests will be confirmed in class.

Written assignments in Ensemble : Littérature will be explained in class and are due once a week (10 minimum).

The final percentage will be based on 55% for tests, 20% for literature assignements, 15% for one 1000-word essay based on the contemporary novel :  $\underline{L'}$  étranger by A. Camus and 10% for class preparation and participation.

(a) Assignments: 20%

Weekly written assignments: 15% and one oral presentation on Camus: 5%

(b) Essay: 15%

(c) Preparation & oral participation: 10%

(d) Tests: 55%
