5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Examination - Tests: There are 3 tests in this course. They will be composed of short answer, fill in the blank, and multiple-choice questions. Each test is worth 20% of your final grade. The first test covers Chapters 1, 11 and 14; the second test covers Chapters 15 and 16; the third test covers Chapters 17 and 13. There is no comprehensive final exam. All tests are based on information from the lectures, class activities and assigned readings. Students are encouraged to take advantage of study materials available through MyPsychLab to prepare for tests.

Assignments: Completion of three assignments is required. Each assignment is worth 10% of the course grade. Each assignment will involve applying the concepts and theories learned in the course to "real life" situations.

Project: Toward the end of the semester, students will be required to complete a project, worth 10% of the course grade. This project will involve choosing among several topic options provided by the instructor. Students will work by themselves or with a partner. Further information will be provided in class.

Late or Missed Work

No late work will be accepted without prior negotiation. No assignments will be accepted after the last week of classes.

E-mailing assignments

Assignments sent as attachments will only be accepted in order to avoid a late penalty. *A hard copy is required for grading purposes* and is to be submitted to the instructor.

Temporary Grade	Description		
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.		
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
