### 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

## Newspaper/Magazine Critique (10%) - September 27, 2010

This exercise offers the student the opportunity to critique mass media making use of feminist theory. Find an article from a magazine or newspaper that offers an example of gender inequality in **Canada**. Critique the article/author by offering an analysis of how the writing constitutes a gender bias.

#### Test One (15%) - October 4, 2010

The first test will be held at the beginning of class on October 5<sup>th</sup>. It will consist of multiple choice questions based on lecture materials and the assigned readings (Chapters 1-5 from *The Gendered Society)* 

### Test Two (15%) - November 8, 2010

The second test will be held November 2<sup>nd</sup> in the first half of the class. The test will consist of multiple choice questions based on lecture materials and the assigned readings (Chapters 6-9 from *The Gendered Society*).

# Social Movements Report - November 1<sup>st</sup> (15%)

Each student is responsible for reading Part IX of *The Gendered Society* Reader and preparing a 2-4 page report. The report will be a general summary of the main ideas presented in the four Chapters, as well as a discussion of non-governmental organizations in Canadian society that help foster gender equality. Students must be prepared to discuss their reports in class on November 1<sup>st</sup>.

# Identity-Feminist Paper - due November 22<sup>nd</sup> (25%)

Each student is responsible for completing a six-page typewritten paper that addresses the question why you, the author, is a feminist. The paper must employ one of the feminist theories discussed in class, illustrating to the reader that what you write about is analytical rather than descriptive. A more thorough discussion of this assignment will be undertaken in class.

# Final Test - December 6<sup>th</sup> (in class) (20%)

The third test will be held in class on December 7<sup>th</sup> final class). This test will be based on lecture materials and assigned readings including: Chapters 10-12 and Epilogue of *The Gendered Society*

#### **Temporary Grades**

Temporary Grade	Description
1	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
