2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1) Describe the key art movements and artists in the growth of Modern art beginning c. 1750
- 2) Describe the techniques, processes, and theories of Modern art making
- 3) Discuss the relationship between art and social change

3. Materials

- **a) textbook**: *Modern Art History* by Arnason (6th edition)—there are new copies available at Camosun Bookstore, possibly some used ones. There are copies on reserve in the library (2 hour loan). If you like, you can use earlier editions too. For students starting the Visual Arts program in September, the text is mandatory to purchase; everyone else just needs access to a copy.
- **b) writer's/style manual**; for your academic writing, you will be citing your sources using the Chicago Manual of Style (footnotes) format. You can purchase one or use online versions or go to a library.
- **c)** a **sketchbook** (for example, Opus Art supplies an "essential slim sketchbook", 8.5" x 11") about \$9 plus tax; also check out Island Blue on Fort St. or any store that sells art supplies. Bring this to every class (plus paper for taking notes).
- **d) art kit**: in a plastic container with a lid, have a variety of materials to draw/sketch/doodle with: pencils, pens, pencil crayons (if you have chalk pastels, charcoal, conté, etc. put it in your kit); small glue stick, scissors; if you have a digital camera/camera phone, bring it to class, too.
- **e)** optional: **Visual Arts Student Pass** (VASP)--\$12 student membership to the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria (AGGV) located on Moss Street. To purchase, go to the gallery with your Camosun student ID, tell them it is for my course, pay your money and get your membership. Membership expires end of August this year, though.
- f) architecture tour of downtown Victoria (a Saturday afternoon near the end of June)—free; TBC
- g) access to a computer, the web, and PBworks.com

To access course materials, you will need to log onto the Art 180 PBworks site.

- 1) open browser and type in: art180.pbworks.com

4. Course Content

Welcome to the fascinating world of visual culture!

This course explores Western art and architecture beginning c. 1750 and moving chronologically to contemporary art and architecture in the 1990s. As it is clearly impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few areas and artists will be explored. The artistic legacies we do investigate will be considered and discussed according to their meaning(s) and function(s) in relation to the specific society and/or culture that produced the art. Art works will also be examined according to styles and artistic techniques.

a) Course requirements: Celebration of knowledge (exams)

Exams are based on a <u>combination</u> of lecture notes *and* material from the textbook plus additional independent research conducted on-line or from books. Just reading the text or attending the lectures will not be enough! Also, there is something from every lecture on the exams. You will be given an exam overview ahead of time—as well as the essay questions—so you can prepare. You are allowed to bring in an answer outline/information for the essay. Details will be posted on PBworks and discussed in class.

Missed exams & Make-up exams

If a student misses an exam due to illness or extenuating circumstances, notify me <u>immediately</u> (voice mail is acceptable). Medical (written) certification must be produced within **three** (3) week days of missed exam before alternate testing will be arranged; otherwise a grade of "0" will be issued for that exam. The make-up exam is scheduled within 3 weekdays of the missed exam, and is different from the one given in class.

b) Class participation & sketchbook assignments

Part of the grade in this course will come from "sketchbook assignments" and your attendance and participation in the class. The purpose of the sketchbook assignments is to provide an active, hands-on approach to learning and exploring the course content—and a place to reflect and contemplate modern art issues, practices, and approaches as well as your own responses to it. The sketchbook assignments are graded for completion, that is, if they are completed with thought and care, you will receive full marks. The sketchbooks will be taken in when you write each exam.
