5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of <u>Ensemble : grammaire</u> from Chapter 7 up to and including Chapter 11 and the mini- review (ch.1). Students are expected to complete the exercises in the grammar book and do the necessary oral review with monitors. Dates of tests will be confirmed in class; because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing.

Written assignments (paper copy) are due once a week following the weekly readings in Explorations: Schunk/Waisbrot (10 minimum).

The final percentage will be based on 60% for tests, 15% for class preparation and participation, 10% for literature assignments, 15% for two 1000-word essays on:

Ionesco: (La Cantatrice Chauve) and Molière: (Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme).

- (a) Assignments : 10% Weekly written assignments
- (b) Preparation and Oral participation: 15%
- (c) Essays: 15% (Ionesco= 5% Molière = 10%)
- (d) Tests: 60%
