2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the use of traditional and non-traditional processes integral with creative exploration and aesthetic development.
- 2. Describe the creative process in the planning and creation of 3D artwork using drawings and blueprints.
- 3. With clay as the primary medium, combine other media, mechanics and innovative processes to interpret and develop ceramic imagery.

3. Required Materials

- (b) Tools required All students have there own tools which will consist of: one small loop tool, a wire cutting tool, a pin tool, a small sponge, a large sponge, paint brushes, plastic buckets with lids and lids (pottery), plastic jars with water tight lids for mixing colour/airbrush and a hand towel. You will add more tools as needed; this is a mandatory requirement for pottery.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- 1) Students must complete all in class assignments by their due date, which then must be kept in a portfolio to be evaluated at mid-term and graded at the end of term. (75%)
- 2) Out of class assignments (e.g. sketchbooks) will be assessed on a regular basis. (10%)
- 3) Bonus for enthusiastic pursuit of a ceramic interest(s) outside of required assignments using above evaluative criteria. (10%)
- 4) Attendance and involvement in class discussions and critiques, along with personal involvement (attitude and cleanliness) in all studio (class) and lab work. (15%)

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
