5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will write chapter tests on all lessons of Ensemble : Grammaire up to and including Chapter 6. Because of the oral component of the tests, there is no late writing ; the dates of tests will be confirmed in class.

Written assignments in Ensemble : Littérature will be explained in class and are due once a week (10 minimum). No assignments will be accepted via e-mail.

The final percentage will be based on 60% for tests, 10% for literature assignments, 15% for one 1000-word essay based on the contemporary novel : L' étranger by A. Camus, and 15% for class preparation and participation.
