1. Assess the changing geographical, social and economic diversity of Asia in the contemporary period.
2. Examine the impacts of globalization, industrialization and urbanization on the environment of Asia.
3. Analyze how globalization impacts the economic development patterns, processes of industrialization, and regional trade and investment relationships in Asia.

Course Requirements and Prerequisites

Course Topic Units

The course will be organized in six topic units:

- I. Pacific Rim Region: Geography, History and Political Development: the aim of this unit is to introduce the concept of the Pacific Rim region and its geographical delimitation and socio-economic characteristics. A review of the historical and political changes in the region will be undertaken.
- II. Economic Development: this unit provides an analysis of the major economic, industrial, and agricultural development strategies adopted by various Pacific Rim countries. The growth of the regional economy, employment structure, and inter-region economic cooperation efforts will be studied in detail.
- III. Globalization, Foreign Trade and Investment: the aim of this unit is to study the patterns of globalization and its impact on foreign trade and investment in the Pacific Rim region.
- IV. Population and Urbanization: the purpose of this unit is to highlight the divergent patterns of population and urban growth and their impacts on environment and economic development in the region.
- V. Resource and Environment: the unit will identify the impact of globalization and economic development on the environmental conditions, including pollution, deforestation, and degradation.. An examination of the environmental policies and issues are highlighted.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a) Assignments

Assignments – Sec 01

Labs (22.5%): A total of 4 labs will be assigned and the best 3 labs are to be counted. See schedule below or details of assignment and due days.

Term Paper (27.5%): Students are required to conduct research on the contemporary development issues facing one or more the Asia-Pacific region. All paper topics have to be approved by the instructor. The completed paper, with no more than 2,000 words, should be typewritten and submitted as scheduled. Late papers will not be accepted unless prior **approval** by the instructor is obtained. Marks for late papers are to be deducted by two percent per day.

Oral Presentation (10%): Each student is expected to give a 10-15 minutes summary of his/her term paper. Schedule will be assigned by instructor.

Tests

Test 1 (20%): The first test will be based on the reading and lecture materials covered in the first half of the course. See course schedule for details.

Test 2 (20%): Test 2 will be based on the reading and lecture materials covered since Test 1. See course schedule for test date.

Important Note: A doctor's certificate or equivalent is required to take a supplementary examination. Other supplementary examinations approved by the instructor may be subjected to a penalty of 2% per day.

Assignments – Sec B01

Labs (22.5%): A total of 4 labs will be assigned and the best 3 labs are to be counted. See schedule below or details of assignment and due days.

Term Paper (27.5%): Students are required to conduct research on the contemporary development issues facing one or more the Asia-Pacific region. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. <i>(For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)</i>
