Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Explain the history of abnormal psychology (psychopathology) and the Canadian Mental Health System.
- 2. Describe the current paradigms and theories that aim to explain the cause and treatment of mental disorders.
- 3. Explain the nature of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual and the classification of mental disorders.
- 4. Describe procedures and methods of assessing mental health.
- 5. Describe current research methods used in the study of abnormal psychology.
- 6. Describe current models of cause and treatment for the following categories of mental disorders: anxiety, somatoform, eating, mood, schizophrenic, substance-abuse, personality, sexual and gender disorders.
- 7. Identify key concepts in the field of health psychology and psycho-neuro-immunology.
- 8. Describe the relationship between the field of abnormal psychology (psychopathology) and the Canadian legal and criminal justice systems.
