- 1. The nature of politics, government, and the state, with special reference to Canada.
- 2. The basics of the executive branch of government the formal, political, and non-political elements, with special reference to the Prime Minister and the cabinet.
- 3. The basics of Parliament its elements, functions, procedures, and problems.
- 4. The basics of the public service its elements, functions, processes, and problems.
- 5. The basics of the justice system types of law, the courts, the administration of justice, and the Charter.
- 6. The basics of political parties their roots, ideologies, financing, leadership selection, and campaigning.
- 7. The basics of the electoral system, and possible alternatives, as well as the role of the press.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Quiz One - 25%

The first exam will be held in class on **Wednesday May 29th.** It will consist of Fill-In-the-Blanks, True / False, Multiple Choice, and Short Answers questions. The exam will cover material from lectures and required readings.

Term Paper - 20%

A separate handout for this assignment will be provided. The final draft of the term paper is due **Wednesday June 12th** at the beginning of class. Students are encouraged to submit a first draft of their term paper by June 5th. This draft will receive substantial feedback and be graded. The final draft will be graded with nominal feedback. Students will receive the higher of the two grades. Late assignments will be penalized 5% per day late.

Quiz Two - 25%

A second examination will be given in class on **Wednesday June 19th**. The format will be similar to the first exam. The exam will be based on material covered *since* the first exam and will include material from lectures and required readings.

Final Exam – 20%

A final examination will be held at some point over the exam period. Students will be informed as soon as possible regarding the exact date, time and location. The format will differ from the quizzes. This exam will cover material presented in the course as a whole. Students will write four short essays out of eight potential questions. There will be a brief review after Quiz Two.

Chapter Reading Micro Quizzes – (10 micro quizzes worth .5% each) – 5% Each chapter students will be asked to take an online multiple choice quizzes that accompanies the textbook readings. The quizzes will cover the readings for each new chapter and must be completed **prior** to that chapter's lecture. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the lecture. For example, chapter one's on-line reading quiz closes Wednesday May 8 at 7:30 AM (an hour before the lecture for that class).

Participation - 5%

All students will be asked to make a meaningful contribution to class discussions. Quality of participation is far more prized than quantity of comments.
