Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Summarize the main theories relating to the study of lifespan* development.
- 2. Describe the physical, cognitive and social changes that occur across the lifespan.
- 3. Explain the impact of culture and diversity on development across the lifespan.
- 4. Apply developmental theory and research techniques to an individual case study of human development.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Students will explore human development from conception until death, focusing on critical milestones achieved across the ages in the areas of physical, cognitive and social development. Cultural diversity of experience will be examined, as well as modern theoretical models explaining human development.

EVALUATION:

1. Journal: Each student will create a journal of **ten** entries (1% each) examining presentations/articles/ topics that focus on social and physical changes in development. Topics will be presented by the instructor – examples include: the effects of daycare on social development, ongoing problems and changes in understanding privacy, bullying across the lifespan. In addition, each student may choose a relevant from personal experience or media content.

DUE: June 12, 2013

TOTAL VALUE: 10%

2. Assignments: There will be **THREE** written assignments (10% each), out of several topics given in the first class, and due in class on the dates indicated below. Each assignment will involve preparing a short discussion paper (**maximum** = **three** double-spaced pages) in response to an assigned topic. The format of the paper is APA style.

Note: No late assignments will be accepted. They are due on <u>3</u> of the following dates, i.e., each student will choose 3 dates from: **May 13, 27, June 3, 10, 17, 2013**

TOTAL VALUE: 30%

3. Examinations: There will be **THREE** short answer examinations covering information presented in the text and in class.

Examinations: May 22, June 10, June 19, 2013

TOTAL VALUE: 55%

4. In-class Debates: Groups of four (MAXIMUM OF 4) students will take a perspective - pro or con- on a subject and debate that issue with another group. You should prepare your presentation so that your group is an "expert" on the topic. There will be time for a rebuttal. The class is welcome to ask questions of either group after the presentation of the position, ~ 20 minutes.

TOTAL VALUE: 5%

Note: You are responsible for materials in lectures you do not attend. Tests and examinations will contain short-answer questions. Missed examinations with a valid reason will be made up at the earliest convenient time. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
