#### 1. Instructor Information

#### 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Examine fundamental theory and concepts related to contemporary photography and film and their relationship within studio application, filmmaking traditions and contemporary culture.
- 2. Explore and discuss the interaction of movement in time, space and stillness as a way to better understand the theoretical and experiential associations between film and photography
- 3. Examine and apply the basic technical skills required to operate lens-based digital still and video cameras (including 'nontraditional' lens based cameras).
- 4. Examine and apply the basic technical skills of postproduction (editing) programs such as Photoshop and Premiere.
- 5. Create small projects demonstrating an understanding of the fundamental formal, technical and theoretical aspects of photography and film making in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.
- 6. Interpret and employ contemporary concepts and techniques of making pictures through exposure to the general history of lens-based media (photography and film). Students will learn how to draw from this history while creating meaningful and relevant independent and group projects.
- 7. Become critical thinkers within the realm of lens-based communication who are both thoughtful and confident when critiquing their own work as well as the work of others.

### 3. Required Materials

- (a) **Functional Digital SLR camera** which you are required to have with you for each and every class and lab (video shooting capabilities not required but would be an asset).
- (b) External Hard Drive 500GB min size (for project storage)
- (c) Text The Cinematic; Documents of Contemporary Art Edited by David Campany

#### 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) 30% Final Project with accompanying source and planning material 'binder'
- (b) 40% Technical / conceptual projects
  - Tableau Photography (20%)
  - 2-3 minute Video/Film (20%)
- (c) 20% Lab based excercises (technical excercises)
- (d) 10% \*<u>Attendance</u>: Involvement and Participation. This is very important due to the nature of a seminar type class. Topic driven organic communication (e.g. discussion, feedback, listening), cannot be re-created or made up if a class is missed.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 <sup>rd</sup> course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
