<u>Labs</u> (22.5%): A total of 4 labs will be assigned and the best 3 labs are to be counted. See schedule below or details of assignment and due days.

Term Paper (27.5%): Students are required to conduct research on the contemporary development issues facing one or more the Asia-Pacific region. All paper topics have to be approved by the instructor. The completed paper, with no more than 2,000 words, should be typewritten and submitted as scheduled. Late papers will not be accepted unless prior approval by the instructor is obtained. Marks for late papers are to be deducted by two percent per day.

Oral Presentation (10%): Each student is expected to give a 10-15 minutes summary of his/her term paper. Schedule will be assigned by instructor.

- <u>Test 1</u> (20%): The first test will be based on the reading and lecture materials covered in the first half of the course. See course schedule for details.
- <u>Test 2</u> (20%): Test 2 will be based on the reading and lecture materials covered since Test 1. See course schedule for test date.
- <u>Important Note</u>: A doctor's certificate or equivalent is required to take a supplementary examination. Other supplementary examinations <u>approved</u> by the instructor may be subjected to a penalty of 2% per day.
