#### **COURSE OUTLINE**

This introductory course examines political parties, elections, the role of the prime minister and cabinet, the public service, the legislature, and the judiciary.

## 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to describe and explain (and in some cases critically assess):

- 1. The nature of politics, government, and the state, with special reference to Canada.
- 2. The basics of the executive branch of government the formal, political, and non-political elements, with special reference to the Prime Minister and the cabinet.
- 3. The basics of Parliament its elements, functions, procedures, and problems.
- 4. The basics of the public service its elements, functions, processes, and problems.
- 5. The basics of the justice system types of law, the courts, the administration of justice, and the Charter.
- 6. The basics of political parties their roots, ideologies, financing, leadership selection, and campaigning.
- 7. The basics of the electoral system, and possible alternatives, as well as the role of the press.

#### 3. Required Materials

#### 4. Course Content & Schedule

#### 1. Syllabus Quiz – 2%

This quiz must be completed by **Friday September 6**<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 PM. A short, true / false, multiple choice online quiz that tests students to ensure they have read, reviewed, and understand the course syllabus.

#### 2. Constituency Assignment - 10%

The Constituency Assignment is due **Friday September 27**<sup>th</sup> **by 5:00 PM.** It must be submitted in Word and submitted to the PSC 106-002 – Constituency Assignment Drop Box. For more details see the assignment hand-out.

## 3. Mid Term Quiz – 15%

The first online test will be offered from Monday October 14<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 AM to Friday October 18<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 PM. The Mid-Term Quiz will cover all readings, videos, discussion topics from beginning of course to the end of week 6. It will consist of two timed sections. The True / False section will consist of 10 questions. Students will have 15 minutes, or 90 seconds per question, to read, consider, and answer the questions. The multiple choice section will consist of 20 questions. Students will have 30 minutes, or 90 seconds per question, to read, consider, and answer the questions. Students will take each section separately. They will see the correct answers and their mark once they have finished the section. It is highly recommended student prepare in advance as they would an in-class quiz.

#### 4. Follow the Leader Assignment - 10%

This assignment is due **Friday November 1 by 5:00 PM.** It must be submitted in Word and submitted to the PSC 106-002 – Follow the Leader Drop Box. For more details see the assignment hand-out.

#### 3. Term Paper - 20%

This assignment is due **Friday November 29 by 5:00 PM.** It must be submitted in Word and submitted to the PSC 106-002 – Term Paper Drop Box. For more details see the assignment handout.

#### 4. Final Quiz - 15%

This quiz will be offered from Monday, December 2 at 9:00 AM to Friday December 6 at 5:00 PM. It covers all readings, videos, discussion topics *since* the Mid-Term exam. It will follow the same format (True/False and Multiple Choice) as the Mid-Term Quiz and will carry the same time restrictions.

#### 5. Chapter Reading Micro Quizzes – (8 micro quizzes worth 1% each) – 8%

Over ten weeks, students will be asked to take eight online multiple choice quizzes that accompany that week's textbook readings. Students may complete all ten quizzes, if they wish. The lowest two scores will be disregarded. The quizzes will cover the readings for each new chapter. The online submission window will open the previous Friday at 5:00 PM and close at 5:00 PM on the Monday of that week. For example, chapter one's on-line reading quiz opens on Friday September 6<sup>th</sup> and closes Monday September 9<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 PM. In short, the reading quizzes are designed to ensure students keep pace with the readings on a weekly basis, but permit students to miss two reading quizzes without penalty.

**6.** Weekly Discussion Responses − (5 discussions worth 4% each) − **20**%

Over ten weeks, students will submit a written response to **five (and only 5)** of the ten weekly discussion question. Students will be graded out of 8 for each week they submit. Students will be asked to not only submit their initial answer to the question, but also consider and respond to the on-going conversation. An initial answer to the week's question must land between 150 to 200 words. The initial submission must be made by no later than Wednesday at noon. No student will be permitted to post more than 400 words total for any given week. The writing should reflect a university level, although full citation will not be required. All discussion and debate will demand a respectful tone and reflect everyone's willingness to disagree honourably. Failure to comply with this simple academic standard will result in a mark of zero for that week. In other words, this is not a place to flame anyone. All students are encouraged to review the weekly conversations as the main themes from a discussion question may be incorporated into the quizzes.

# 5. Course Organization

This course is divided into 14 weeks. The course is designed to ensure that students keep pace with material on a week-to-week basis. Many assignments, reading quizzes and weekly discussions for example, must be completed that week or result in a mark of zero.

## **Temporary Grades**

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 <sup>rd</sup> course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
