2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe major contemporary issues in psychology and explain their historical antecedents.
- 2. Apply psychological theories and understanding of current psychological issues to personal experience.
- 3. Conduct impartial studies of psychological topics and arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Acquaints the student with major contemporary issues in psychology and considers their historical antecedents. Topics in Life Span Development, Personality, Abnormal Behavior, Social Cognition, Social Influence, and Social Relations are considered.

Prerequisites: English 12 or assessment.

Course Organization:

Classes will be comprised of lectures and experiential work. Material from the text and selected readings related to current psychological issues and treatments will be examined. Experiential work includes discussions, activities, and student presentations. Attendance and participation are very important for learning. <u>DOING THE ASSIGNED READING BEFORE</u> <u>CLASS WILL HELP IN THE UNDERSTANDING OF LECTURES AND DISCUSSIONS.</u> ASSIGNED READING IS PERTINENT TO DOING WELL ON THE MULTIPLE CHOICE <u>QUESTIONS, ON QUIZZES</u>. Five quizzes will comprise multiple choices, true and false and short answer. Quizzes expect you to apply the terms and concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions Five quizzes will make up 70% of course grade. Details will be discussed In class. There are **NO MAKEUP QUIZZES**. If for medical or personal reasons you cannot write one of the quizzes, an alternative will be to complete a "third" assignment. Missing more than one quiz, please discuss with Instructor.

Completion of two assignments are required, each one is worth 15% of the course grade. Each assignment involves applying the concepts and theories learned in the course. In both assignments, students can choose from among five different option topics. Please refer to separate package distributed in class for further details. Each written assignment is required to have: a running head, pagination, title page including: title of topic, course name and section, instructor's name, student's name, and date. (APA style 6th edition). An assignment may be send as an attachment to avoid late penalty.

Seminar Presentation-Social Issue: With a partner or group of three a presentation on a social issue is one of the five option topics. Further details will be discussed in seminar and guidelines will be provided. This assignment is worth 15% and a written outline of your responsibilities(one for each group) is due one week prior to the presentation. Two mark penalty is applied to a late or no submission. These outlines will be provided in class.

Late or Missed Work:

A late 2 mark per day penalty will apply to assignments submitted after due date without Instructor permission. <u>Please schedule your time to meet all due</u> <u>dates and make arrangements with the Instructor for any extensions</u>.
