2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1) Describe the key art movements and artists in the growth of Modern art beginning c. 1750
- 2) Describe the techniques, processes, and theories of Modern art making
- 3) Discuss the relationship between art and social change

3. Materials (required & optional) and activities outside of class time

- a) you need <u>access</u> to the **textbook** (**purchase OR library**): *Modern Art History* by Arnason and Mansfield (2010)—there are new copies available at Camosun Bookstore, possibly some used ones there—or at other bookstores in town. There is 1 copy on 2 hour reserve in the library. You may use earlier editions of the text.
- b) writer's/style manual for your research and writing. You will be citing your sources using the Chicago Manual of Style (footnotes). I will provide a style sheet on PBworks. A fantastic site: http://www.noslangues-ourlanguages.gc.ca/bien-well/fra-eng/index-eng.html
- c) access to a computer and the web; an email account, log on to PBworks.com to access course material

Here's what to do (log on for NEXT class)

- 1) open browser and type in: art180.pbworks.com
- 2) right column, click on "request access"
- 3) type in the email address you use on a regular basis; click "send to administrator"
- 4) I receive a message that you requested access, and then I grant access
- 5) go to the website and make sure you can access it!!!

There are computers on the computer labs and library that have Word loaded if you do not have your own copy.

e) <u>REQUIRED</u> Visual arts student pass (VASP) for the AGGV (about \$12)

You are required to submit a completed field trip waiver form. Details of the AGGV trip will be posted on PBworks.

4. Course Content

Welcome to the *fascinating* world of visual culture! This course explores Western art and architecture beginning c. 1750 and moving chronologically to contemporary art and architecture in the 1990s. As it is clearly impossible to cover all countries, art historical periods, artists, and artistic mediums, only a select few areas and artists will be explored.

The artistic legacies we do investigate will be considered and discussed according to their meaning(s) and function(s) in relation to the specific society and/or culture that produced the art. Art works will also be examined according to styles and artistic techniques.

Warning: During the there will be images and themes that some students may find troubling or controversial. If you feel this is going to adversely affect you or your ability to attend the lectures and/or complete assignments, you should re-consider taking this class.

Note: the lecture schedule is posted on PBworks.

THINGS TO NOTE:

- this is a university-transfer class (UT class) and so this course is taught at this level; exams & research papers are marked according to a 100 level UT.
- there are no make up exams or extra assignments to increase your grade.

ASSIGN #1: EMILY CARR ASSIGNMENT (500 WORDS); SEE PBWORKS

ASSIGN #2: LIBRARY ASSIGNMENT

The library assignment assists students with the beginning steps for the academic research project, which is based on public art (including street art) in Greater Victoria. The exact assignment will be posted on the PBworks site.

ASSIGN #3: ACADEMIC RESARCH PROJECT ESSAY & SUMMARY

From the list on PBworks, select an art piece to research. Using 1750 words of **essay text**, craft an academic research essay that analyzes the art piece according to the criteria stated in the assignment (see PBworks for the assignment). You need to have a title page, then the essay text using footnotes to cite your sources; the final page is your bibliography. You need to use books, journals, and online sources. The essay will be based on public art in Greater Victoria. You will write an essay of 1750 words (7 pages) and from that, create a 500 word summary for the "art tour" booklet.

Academic consequences if source material is not cited

Not citing your sources is a form of plagiarism and, therefore, cannot receive a passing grade. If you are not sure about when and how to cite your sources, consult your *Style Manual*. Camosun has an **Academic Conduct Policy** and it is the **student's responsibility** to become familiar with the content of this policy (see College's web site).

Late essay Late assignments will be penalized. Until I hold the assignment in my hands, **5% per day** will be deducted from the final assignment grade. The weekend (Sat & Sun) counts as 1 day. Assignments may not be accepted after 1 calendar week (7 days) from due date *unless special permission is arranged <u>beforehand</u>.*

EXAM 1, 2 AND 3

Exams are based on a <u>combination</u> of lecture notes *and* material on the pbworks website as well as conducting additional research. Completing the readings or attending the lectures will not be enough! Also, there is something from every lecture on the exams. You will be given an exam overview ahead of time—as well as the essay questions—so you can prepare. You are allowed to bring in an outline for the essay portion of the exam.

Missed exams & Make-up exams. If a student misses an exam due to illness or extenuating circumstances, notify me immediately (voice mail is acceptable). Medical (written) certification must be produced within three (3) week days of missed exam before alternate testing will be arranged; otherwise a grade of "0" will be issued for that exam. The make-up exam is scheduled within 3 weekdays of the missed exam, and is different from the one given in class.
